AZ Speaks: Paper Sons - Tales of Chain Migration in Tucson. "Paper sons" is a term used for young Chinese immigrants coming to the U.S. prior to 1943 who claimed to be sons of citizens but were, in fact, sons on paper only. After the 1882 Chinese Exclusion Act and other discriminatory legislation restricted the Chinese from entering the U.S. and becoming naturalized citizens, they created ingenious ways of bringing in their close kin, clan relatives or fellow villagers by using false identities and claiming they were sons of American citizens of Chinese ancestry. These long, complex and painful processes had enduring negative effects on the lives and psyches of these immigrants, as revealed by the stories of the "paper sons" among the Gin clan in Tucson's Chinese community.
