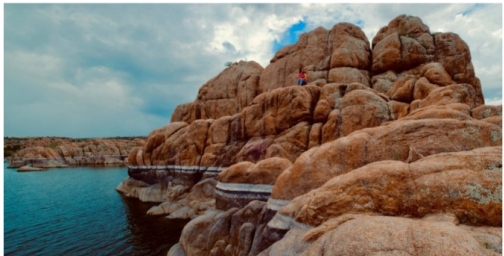

As we look to our future, many questions arise. Where does our water come from? Who benefited from changing water politics? How did moving water systems affect different communities, and how have those effects been recognized through treaties and policies governing water? Perhaps most importantly, in the face of a changing climate: how sustainable are our present-day water policies and infrastructure? Don't miss these two **Artist Talks** in the **Main Library Auditorium**, funded by the City of Glendale Public Art Program as a part of **Vision & Sound: An African American Experience**, a series of art exhibits, artist presentations, and events.

- **Stephen Marc.** This documentary/street photographer and digital montage artist will examine how his work collectively addresses who we are as Americans during a time that has proved to be pivotal and polarized. **Saturday, February 4, 10-11 AM.**
- **Aaron Allen Marner.** This mixed-media artist, painter, and muralist will share creative, vibrant portraits, figurative subjects, graffiti-based work, and collage. **Monday, February 6, 6-7:30 PM.**
